FINAL PROJECT DESCRIPTION: FOODforKIDS-MONTGOMERY was designed to demonstrate the value, in terms of better health, grades, attitudes and self-esteem, of providing weekend food for homeless children in Montgomery's public schools. We talked with members of True Divine Baptist Church, which had started a similar program at Brewbaker Elementary School a few weeks earlier, about their procedures and issues. We established the first pilot program at Capitol Heights Middle School. Approval for this demonstration was secured by the principal, Bobby Abrams, from MPS. We raised \$3,250 from several sources including, Publix, Alfa, St. James Methodist Church, Target, and Little Mountain Growers. We established Leadership Montgomery as an agency authorized to shop at the Montgomery Area Regional Food Bank. Target gave us enough backpacks to begin with 12 qualified homeless students at Capitol Heights. These packs were each filled with six to eight pounds of food purchased at 18 cents on the dollar from the Food Bank, and given to the students every Friday afternoon. Parent volunteers received training on Food Bank procedures, and did most of the shopping each week. This program now has 25 students participating, all with parental or guardian approval. A second demonstration began at Carver Elementary School in March, 2013. The same procedures were followed. That program now has 22 students with more asking to come in. Time and other constraints have prevented us from fully evaluating the effect of this program on student grades, health, attitudes, and self-esteem. We expect to have sufficient funds remaining to augment any monies raised by the local PTA to continue the program at least at Carver, during 2014. Perhaps some answers to these questions will be forthcoming at a later time or in replication of the program in future classes.



WHO WAS SERVED AND HOW MANY PEOPLE BENEFITTED? Homeless children in Montgomery Public Schools were served. About 50 children are now each receiving approximately eight pounds of food every Friday.

OTHER AGENCIES AND GROUPS WHO WERE INVOLVED: Montgomery Area Regional Food Bank; Alabama State University; Montgomery Public Schools; Alfa; Publix; Target; Little Mountain Growers; True Divine Baptist Church; Leadership Montgomery; St. James United Methodist Church.

VISION FOR THE FUTURE OF THIS PROJECT: This project was intended to demonstrate the applicability of Backpacking as a way to provide food for homeless children during the weekends. It proved successful at both the elementary and middle school levels. It will continue next year at Carver Elementary, and might conceivably be adopted by others as the year progresses. It will require leadership from MPS administrators, school principals and faculty, and from local parent volunteers.
