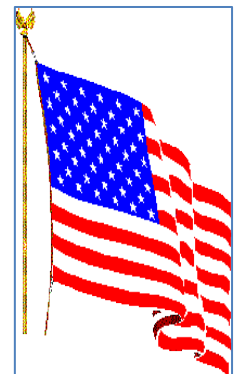

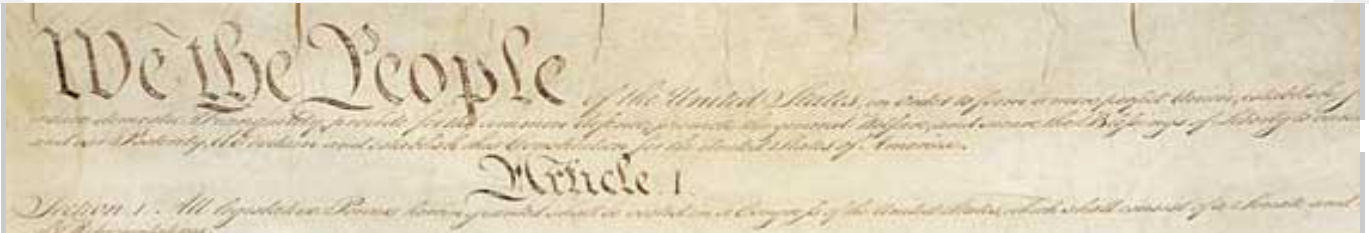

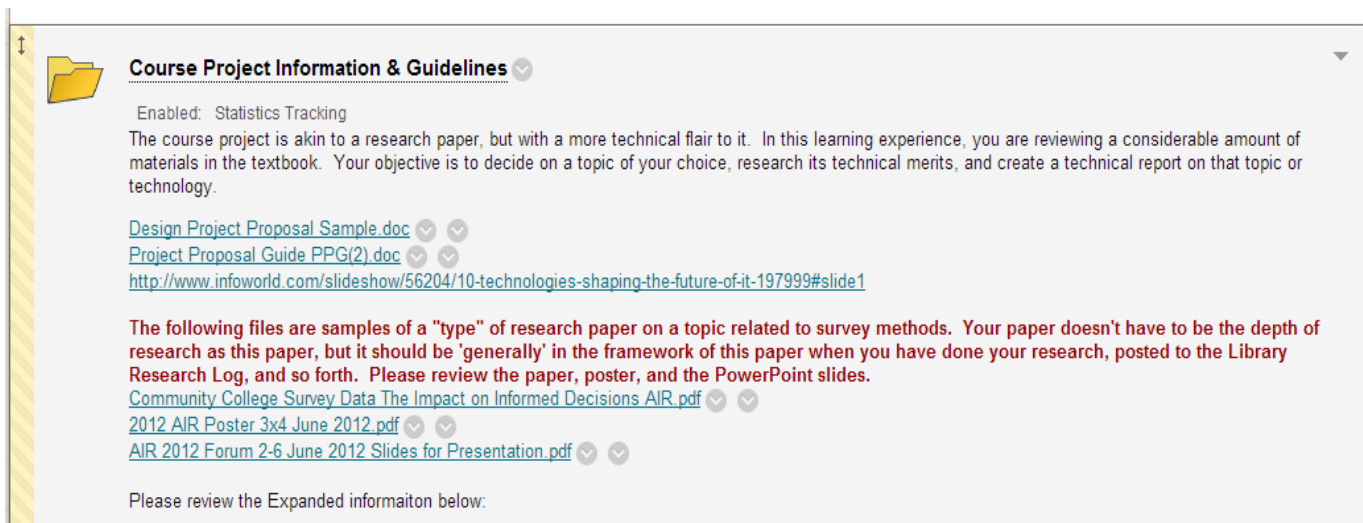

Revised Item For The Design Project Proposal and the Design Project Course Journal (DPCJ)

There have been several requests for further explanation for the Design Project Proposal. Let me define it here and then I will give you the link to the Project Proposal Guide (PPG) and the Course Journal. In each course, there are chapters or tutorials for the development of your knowledge. For each course, I am revising the PPG and including information about the newly Christened 'Design Project Course Journal (DPCJ)' so that it might be easier to understand the items that you are completing.

1. The DPP or Design Project Proposal: The intent of the DPP is for you to submit a document of a few pages that is actually a submission with the intent to have you consider what you will be doing in the course. IN other words, the DPP is a document that simply says, "I intend to learn what I can, document what I am doing, do some research on the topic, submit my DPCJ at the end of the semester, add some images to demonstrate my work, and so forth." The DPP is not the project; it is a proposal to entice you to begin thinking about your course project. Some terms you have heard or may be familiar with are: project paper, technical paper, course project, and/or research paper. Your DPP is a short notification that has the intent to let your instructor know that you are doing some reading, have thought about the work in the course, and have the intent to begin in the chapters or tutorials. The proposal is not a paper that needs a table of contents or a lot of citations; it is a 2/3/4/5/6/7 or so page paper that tells me that you are ready to begin and here is what you plan to do. If you have no idea what you are going to do, then you need to propose something to the effect that "I have no clue, I will do my work, I will research as I learn, I will capture screen shots of my work, and I will..." Proposal – to suggest to someone what you intend to do. In Blackboard, I've given you an example that I developed, but that might be too lengthy for your own submission of a proposal. You have two items that help with this. The first is the Design Project Proposal Rubric, and the second is the Design Project Proposal Sample. Both of these are located in Week 1:



Course Project Information & Guidelines

Enabled: Statistics Tracking

The course project is akin to a research paper, but with a more technical flair to it. In this learning experience, you are reviewing a considerable amount of materials in the textbook. Your objective is to decide on a topic of your choice, research its technical merits, and create a technical report on that topic or technology.

REMEMBER: The DPP is a proposal. It is not something that you will need to keep in your Smart Phone Favorites; however, it is a beginning for the course and may be very useful as you develop your Design Project Course Journal (DPCJ). A suggestion is to look at short proposal examples for business organizations. They don’t need to be so ‘formal’, they just need to be an attempt at starting. You should consider your proposal as your method of telling the world that you are learning to code in HTML, create web pages, post these pages to a hosting site, improve your productivity capability for yourself and your organization. The DPP is a short paper that tells someone that “I intend to...” and then give enough information so that the reader may understand what you are about to attempt. *Questions??????*

The Design Project Course Journal (DPCJ)

The DPCJ is your 'research paper' but it is not like what you are accustomed to writing. Because all courses in the IT field of training are NOT English 101 Papers, your writing will need to be expanded to expose you to variations of writing style. For example, how many of you have ever kept a journal of your experiences? Have any of you ever taken a photo via a camera or your Smartphone? Well, do you remember why you took that image? Can you talk about the image you captured? What did it mean to you? Where was it taken? Who did you plan to show it to and why? What details can you share about the image? Do you look at the image often, seldom, or never? Can the image be used to teach someone else something of value? All of these characteristics are what you will do in your DPCJs.

For example, in Week 1, your DPCJ might list the activities you went through learning about the course, sharing with others in the Discussion Board, what problems you encountered, and what initial work you did. So, if I were developing my own DPCJ, I would have the following (I am providing an outline here so you can see what contents might be in your DPCJ):

1. Cover page with identification information for me, course, instructor, university, date, etc;
2. Table of Contents ... where to find Week 1, Week 2, Appendices;
3. Executive Summary that describes the overall process that is to occur and what the reader will find in my DPCJ;
4. Week 1: a) An overview, work through the materials in the chapter noted, capture a few screen shots, discuss what you did, add a few items to expand on this, gather a few citations to support your work, if you want to do the exercises at the end of the chapter and tutorial, you can but unless you are directed to do so, those are optional; make some personal comments, I like this, I didn't like that, and so forth; if you find something that is of value to you and you might want it in the future, capture that and include it in Week 1. ***** The key to each week's journal is to learn the material first, then document your learning in your DPCJ. When Week 1 is done, you are satisfied with your outcomes, add a summary to Week 1 in the DPCJ and move to Week 2. When done with Week 2, move to 3, 4, 5... *****
5. Repeat Week 1 - Week 15, and as you go, begin to prepare your presentation of your DPCJ. That is simply selecting items and creating a PowerPoint to demonstrate your work. DO NOT, please, simply copy and paste all of your DPCJ into your slides; be selective, and create about a 20-minute slide presentation using some of your materials from the DPCJ;
6. Ask questions along the way;

7. Finally, remember that this course (these courses) is/are MOST interested in your skills development. You will have time in many classes to work on the “Research Paper”, but in technology, reports are centered ‘around’ the validation of what the topic at hand is about. Thus, these courses prepare you to learn how to validate your learning via a DPCJ. IT may be uncomfortable to learn, at first, but as you practice, you will become better and better at the process.

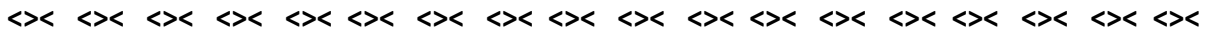

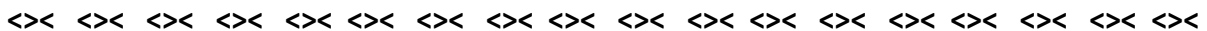
