Trenholm State Technical College celebrated its Leadership Trenholm graduation on Wednesday, October 14.

The day began with a Cabinet meeting, allowing members to view the Cabinet's discussion and decision-making process. President Munnerlyn and his Cabinet worked to make the meeting an inclusive experience for the class members, soliciting their input and questions on a variety of topics.

Graduates then took the stage, making presentations based on their year-long study of issues critical to the College. This problem-based learning activity allowed class members to grapple with challenges faced by the College, including secondary challenges that impact the ability to solve problems. Their creative, indepth presentations demonstrated extensive research, strong critical thinking, and excellent teamwork. Various Cabinet members agreed to meet with these problem-solving groups one-on-one to further explore the ideas and options presented.

Following the presentations and an extensive question-and-answer session, class members enjoyed lunch with the Cabinet. Afterwards, a graduation ceremony celebrated the achievements of each member, with each

"Our Steering Committee did a tremendous job of researching, planning, and carrying out the mission of Leadership Trenholm," she said. "Because of their efforts, our leadership class enjoyed a variety of leadership experiences, including visits to ACHE, Postsecondary, and the Legislature. Students each shadowed two leaders, heard from numerous college and community leaders, and completed an extensive real-world problemsolving project focused on identified challenges of Trenholm State. # THE ART OF ASSESSING STUDENT LEARNING

One major component of providing quality education to students, according to SACS and simply according to sound educational practices, is the development, measurement, and evaluation of student learning outcomes for all instructional units. In fact, the following comprehensive standards from the SACS *Principles of Accreditation* document address the need for all instructional units, including general education, to develop these processes:

- **3.3.1** The institution identifies expected outcomes, assesses the extent to which it achieves these outcomes, and provides evidence of improvement based on analysis of the results in each of the following areas: educational programs, to include student learning outcomes.
- **3.5.1** The institution identifies college-level general education competencies and the extent to which graduates have attained them.

A publication by the Council of Regional Accrediting Commissions (CRAC), of which SACS is a member, had this to say about student learning assessment, "Educational quality cannot be measured solely by retention rates,

graduation rates, or graduates' GRE scores, but rather by evidence of impact on students themselves." While we are all interested in whether our students are "getting" what we are teaching them, the complete integration of the student learning outcomes process proves to be difficult for most programs. First, programs find it hard to express years' worth of learning that takes place while students are getting awards in just a statement or two. Next, the measures of student learning sometimes are hard to attach to the outcome statements. Although instruction in courses is measured through tests, projects, reports, and various other assignments, it is hard for programs to identify a few projects or tests that again assess the culmination of the students' programmatic learning. though, the most difficult aspect of the whole process is finding meaningful data among the measurements to use to improve instruction. The data must be examined as a whole and in part to see what trends are discovered about student learning. Let's take the assessment of student learning in writing as an example. It is helpful certainly to look at overall rubric scores on an essay to see whether the majority of our students are showing average or above average performance in their written communication. However, the most helpful thing to do for concrete classroom teaching making curriculum changes is to look at the breakdown of rubric scores for the various aspects of writing: writing that is unified, coherent, wellsupported, and error-free. From examining the data, faculty might discover that students are lacking in their ability to create coherent documents: therefore, instructional changes need to be implemented to give additional or better quality instruction in that area.

We should keep in mind these ideas regarding the assessment of student learning as we are closing out the assessment cycle for one academic year, 2008-2009, and beginning the cycle for the next year, 2009-2010. Also, we need to remember that results of assessment and noted instructional changes are due to Vicky Ohlson by October 29<sup>th</sup>.

Friday, October 23, 2009, marked the official opening of the Patterson Campus library and ushered in a greater appreciation for the library as the center of knowledge at the College. Through the laborious efforts of Mrs. Zenobia L. Blackmon, head librarian, who, on a rainy day on March 1, 2007, went to the College's Foundation board meeting at *Harper's* and asked for assistance in helping the library become a mecca for student learning. The Board's donation of over \$12,000 was used to buy furnishings for the library, which contributed greatly to its overall appeal. The Patterson Campus library has been operating for two years, and each year brings more improvements. It is staffed primarily by two part-time librarians with the help of the full-time library staff. Since the library's opening, students have consistently utilized the library in increasing numbers daily.

Trenholm State's maintenance department made significant contributions to the library's renovation, which included painting, lowering the ceiling, installing lights, installing new carpet, modifying the entrance doors and making minor repairs. The renovations enhanced the library's overall appearance so that it could be more conducive to student learning. Margaret Law, apparel and design coordinator, provided the finishing interior design touches to the library's interior and foyer to include an original painting. Spencer Arington, graphic communications coordinator designed and installed the signage on the exterior doors.

Mrs. Blackmon said, "The support from the Trenholm State Foundation has been invaluable and is greatly appreciated by the College." Interim Chancellor Joan Davis was present and remarked she was excited to be a part of such a positive event. President Munnerlyn officially dedicated the library, and the ribbon was cut by President Munnerlyn and Interim Chancellor Davis.
